RESOLUTION 2024-09

THE ANNUAL APPROPRIATION RESOLUTION OF THE SUNSHINE WATER CONTROL DISTRICT ("DISTRICT") RELATING TO THE ANNUAL APPROPRIATIONS AND ADOPTING THE BUDGET FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING OCTOBER 1, 2024, AND ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 2025; AUTHORIZING BUDGET AMENDMENTS; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the District Manager has, prior to the fifteenth (15th) day in June, 2024, submitted to the Board of Supervisors ("Board") of the Sunshine Water Control District a proposed budget for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2024 and ending September 30, 2025 ("Fiscal Year 2024/2025") along with an explanatory and complete financial plan for each fund of the District, pursuant to the provisions of Section 189.016, Florida Statutes; and

WHEREAS, at least sixty (60) days prior to the adoption of the Proposed Budget, the District filed a copy of the Proposed Budget with the local governing authorities having jurisdiction over the area included in the District pursuant to the provisions of Section 189.016, *Florida Statutes*; and

WHEREAS, the Board set a public hearing thereon and caused notice of such public hearing to be given by publication pursuant to Section 189.016, *Florida Statutes*; and

WHEREAS, the District Manager posted the Proposed Budget on the District's website at least two days before the public hearing; and

WHEREAS, Section 189.016, Florida Statutes, requires that, prior to October 1st of each year, the District Board, by passage of the Annual Appropriation Resolution, shall adopt a budget for the ensuing fiscal year and appropriate such sums of money as the Board deems necessary to defray all expenditures of the District during the ensuing fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, the District Manager has prepared a Proposed Budget, whereby the budget shall project the cash receipts and disbursements anticipated during a given time period, including reserves for contingencies for emergency or other unanticipated expenditures during the fiscal year.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE SUNSHINE WATER CONTROL DISTRICT:

SECTION 1. BUDGET

- a. The Board has reviewed the Proposed Budget, a copy of which is on file with the office of the District Manager and at the District's Local Records Office, and hereby approves certain amendments thereto, as shown in Section 2 below.
- b. The Proposed Budget, attached hereto as **Exhibit "A,"** as amended by the Board, is hereby adopted in accordance with the provisions of Section 189.016, Florida

Statutes ("Adopted Budget"), and incorporated herein by reference; provided, however, that the comparative figures contained in the Adopted Budget may be subsequently revised as deemed necessary by the District Manager to reflect actual revenues and expenditures.

- c. The Adopted Budget, as amended, shall be maintained in the office of the District Manager and at the District's Local Records Office and identified as "The Budget for the Sunshine Water Control District for the Fiscal Year Ending September 30, 2025".
- d. The Adopted Budget shall be posted by the District Manager on the District's official website within thirty (30) days after adoption, and shall remain on the website for at least 2 years.

SECTION 2. APPROPRIATIONS

There is hereby appropriated out of the revenues of the District, for Fiscal Year 2024/2025, the sum of \$7,565,084 to be raised by the levy of assessments and/or otherwise, which sum is deemed by the Board to be necessary to defray all expenditures of the District during said budget year, to be divided and appropriated in the following fashion:

TOTAL GENERAL FUND \$6,714,197

TOTAL DEBT SERVICES FUND - SERIES 2021 \$ 850,887

TOTAL ALL FUNDS \$7,565,084

SECTION 3. BUDGET AMENDMENTS

Pursuant to Section 189.016, *Florida Statutes*, the District at any time within Fiscal Year 2024/2025 or within 60 days following the end of Fiscal Year 2024/2025 may amend its Adopted Budget for that fiscal year as follows:

- a. The Board may authorize an increase or decrease in line item appropriations within a fund by motion recorded in the minutes if the total appropriations of the fund do not increase.
- b. The District Manager or Treasurer may authorize an increase or decrease in line item appropriations within a fund if the total appropriations of the fund do not increase and if the aggregate change in the original appropriation item does not exceed \$15,000 or 15% of the original appropriation.
- c. By resolution, the Board may increase any appropriation item and/or fund to reflect receipt of any additional unbudgeted monies and make the corresponding change to appropriations or the unappropriated balance.

d. Any other budget amendments shall be adopted by resolution and consistent with Florida law.

The District Manager or Treasurer must establish administrative procedures to ensure that any budget amendments are in compliance with this Section 3 and Section 189.016 of the Florida Statutes, among other applicable laws. Among other procedures, the District Manager or Treasurer must ensure that any amendments to budgets under subparagraphs c. and d. above are posted on the District's website within 5 days after adoption and remain on the website for at least 2 years.

SECTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon adoption.

Billionaire, crew get ready for space flight, historic spacewalk

Jared Isaacman hopes to perform first commercial tethered spacewalk

KENNEDY SPACE CENTER — Billionaire Jared Isaacman hasn't been to space in 1,066 days. He has to wait at least seven more for his return, but this time he hopes to perform the first commercial tethered spacewalk in history.

The man who spearheaded the first all-commercial crew on the Inspiraiton4 mission in September 2021 was back at Kennedy Space Center on Monday with three new crewmates for the private Polaris Dawn mission, a five-day orbital trip. It's the first of three flights Isaacman plans with SpaceX as part of the Polaris Program he announced in

How the costs are being shared between Polaris and SpaceX has not been disclosed.

The four crew members will climb aboard the same spacecraft that took Isaacman to obit the first time, SpaceX's Crew Dragon Resilience, and launch atop a Falcon 9 rocket from KSC's Launch Pad 39-A in just under a week. They're targeting a 3:38 a.m. lift-off during a 3:33-7:15 a.m. launch window on Monday.

Isaacman, who made his fortune as the founder and CEO of credit-card-processing company Shift4 payments, again takes the commander role for the mission. In the pilot seat is friend Scott Poteet, a retired U.S. Air Force lieutenant colonel and demonstration pilot who flew with the Air Force Thunderbirds. The two mission specialists on the flight are both SpaceX employees: Sarah Gillis, who will join Isaacman on the spacewalk, and medical officer Anna Menon.

The quartet arrived with flair as jets from Isaacman's Polaris Ghost Squadron aerobatic team flew over the former shuttle landing facility at KSC.

"We're the four lucky ones that get to go on this ride," Isaacman said. "But I can't tell you how many teams have been working nonstop the last 2-½ years. ... supporting that kind of bigger dreams that you know, maybe not in the not too distant future, humans are going to finally reach another planet."

Next week's mission also will send the Crew Dragon to an altitude much higher than previous flights — flying up to 870 miles above Earth on an elliptical orbit. The record for orbital altitude for a crewed mission was set in 1966, when NASA astronauts Pete Conrad and Richard Gordon flew on the Gemini 11 to 853 miles.

The spacecraft will then

descend back to about 430 miles altitude where the one-hour spacewalk will happen. Isaacman's and Gillis' suits will be connected to the spacecraft with 12-foot-long tethers as each takes turns outside in the vacuum of space. Poteet and Menon, though, will also have to be in the EVA spacesuits as Crew Dragon has no airlock, so its entire cabin will have no atmosphere.

The final main objective of the mission is to test laser-based communication using Starlink satellites, but the five days will also be filled with about 40 science experiments.



Compensation applications reviewed for boys abused at Dozier school

TALLAHASSEE – Physical abuse. Mental abuse. Sexual Abuse. Corporal punishment. Excessive force. Dismissive safety controls. Rehabilitative negligence.

The categories of "victimization" — and "other" — are checkboxes included on a draft application that will pave the way for survivors

of abuse decades ago at two state-run reform schools to prove they're eligible for shares in a \$20 million compensation program approved this year by the Florida Legislature and Gov. Ron DeSantis.

Nearly two dozen men, most of them elderly, inspected draft copies of the proposed applications during a Monday meeting in downtown Tallahassee, peppering some of Attorney General Ashley Moody's aides with questions about reparations for the brutality they endured as children and adolescents at the notorious Arthur G. Dozier School for Boys in Marianna and Okeechobee School in South Florida.

The program, years in the making, will compensate people who were at the reform schools between 1940 and 1975 and "who were subjected to mental, physical or sexual abuse perpetrated by school personnel." The plan requires Moody's office to set up a process to "accept, review, and approve or deny applications for the payment of compensation." The money will be divided evenly between eligible applicants.

În addition to checkboxes indicating the type of abuse they suffered, the three-page application includes

a blank space to provide a "brief description of the physical, mental, or sexual abuse you were forced to endure while confined" at the reform schools. That mirrors part of the new law creating the compensation program and outlining eligibility for compensation. Applicants also have to provide records proving they attended the schools during the relevant years, and the applications must be notarized.

The law gave people until Dec. 31 to apply. The money must be distributed by the end of June, said Joe Spataro, an associate deputy attorney general who led Monday's meeting.

Many of the men who attended the meeting expressed concern about potential delays in finalizing the application process, in part because only survivors — not their heirs or estates — are eligible to apply for compensation.

"This is time sensitive. You take a look at us folks. We're old people. Numerous have died already. If this doesn't get through, there's no telling how many people will die over the next six months," said Charles Fudge, a 76-year-old who traveled from Homosassa to attend the meeting. "I don't have much left in my life unless God has plans that I don't know about."

Fudge is one of the leaders of a group of Dozier men known as the "White House Boys," a moniker derived from the white concrete building where boys were beaten and raped by school workers. Members of the White House Boys have traveled to Tallahassee for more than a decade to share their traumas with state lawmakers.

Cecil Gardner, 80, also urged Moody's staff to expe-

dite the application process. "I've been diagnosed with cancer, and I don't know how long I've got to live. And if I die today or tomorrow, my wife don't have anything, and she's 79 years old. So this has been really an uphill battle, really, that I've lost," said Gardner, who was raped at age 14 by a Dozier employee.

Fudge asked Spataro if former students of the reform schools who are incarcerated are eligible for the compensation.

"The statute is silent on that issue. We're going to review each application on an individual basis to determine who is eligible under the new state law," the lawyer said.

Spataro also was asked what would happen if an applicant dies after submitting an application but before receiving a payout.

"Good question," he

initially said before conferring with Ed Tellechea, chief assistant attorney general.

"Our reading of the statute is that the application is what you have to be alive to make," Spataro said.

His response offered reassurance among the attendees but also drew follow-up questions about how the process would work for families or estates of deceased applicants. Spataro tried to assuage their concerns.

"I know you guys have been dealing with this for your whole lives, and you have medical issues and feel elderly although you're all quite sprightly and lively today, fortunately," he said. "That's obviously not what we're hoping for ... We'll cross that bridge when we get to it."

Fudge said the discussion "gave him great confidence" about the process.

"You know, at our age, if we get ours filled out, get them in early and get them approved and we pass away, then, yeah, it'll be nice for our family to receive that," he told The News Service of Florida after the meeting.

Katherine Blair, an attorney with the U.S. Public Defender's Office for the Northern District of Florida who requested Monday's hearing about the proposed application, asked if the forms could be amended to address concerns about victims who might lack documentation of their time at the schools or be unable to complete a narrative detailing their abuse.

But Spataro said any changes would delay finalizing the forms and slow down the application process. He said Moody's office "will be working with applicants that need to supplement" their submissions.

"We tried to make this ...
really as easy as possible for
the folks that are applying.
The goal here isn't to make
this a difficult process. It's
our feeling that the rule and
the application as they're
crafted are the most streamlined, user friendly," Spataro

James Anderson, 73, of Floral City, was 14 when he attended the Okeechobee School. He told the News Service he suffered beatings from staff members, who also "turned a blind eye" to bullying from other boys.

"I wish I could say, and I can't say this, I wish I could say that what they did to me, then, is responsible for all the failures in my life. I can't say that. I can say this. I went there a very angry young person, and I left there full of rage. It was like pouring gasoline on the fire. That's what they did," Anderson said.

A Board meeting of the District will also be held where the Board may consider any other District business.

Description of Assessments

The District imposes 0&M Assessments on benefitted property within the District for the purpose of funding the District's general administrative, operations, and maintenance budget. Pursuant to Section 170.07, Florida Statutes, a description of the services to be funded by the 0&M Assessments, and the properties to be improved and benefitted from the 0&M Assessments, are all set forth in the Proposed Budget. A geographic depiction of the property potentially subject to the proposed 0&M Assessments is identified in the map attached hereto. The table below shows the schedule of the proposed 0&M Assessments, which are subject to change at the hearing:

The proposed 0&M Assessments as stated include collection costs and/or early payment discounts, which Broward County ("County") may impose on assessments that are collected on the County tax bill. Moreover, pursuant to Section 197.3632(4), Florida Statutes, the lien amount shall serve as the "maximum rate" authorized by law for 0&M Assessments, such that no assessment hearing shall be held or notice provided in future years unless the assessments are proposed to be increased or another criterion within Section 197.3632(4), Florida Statutes, is met. Note that the 0&M Assessments do not include any debt service assessments previously levied by the District and due to be collected for Fiscal Year 2024/2025.

For Fiscal Year 2024/2025, the District intends to have the County tax collector collect the assessments imposed on certain developed property, and will directly collect the assessments imposed on the remaining benefitted property by sending out a bill prior to, or during, November 2024. It is important to pay your assessment because failure to pay will cause a tax certificate to be issued against the property which may result in loss of title, or for direct billed assessments, may result in a foreclosure action, which also may result in a loss of title. The District's decision to collect assessments on the tax roll or by direct billing does not preclude the District from later electing to collect those or other assessments in a different manner at a future time.

Additional Provisions

The public hearings and meeting are open to the public and will be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Florida law. A copy of the Proposed Budget, proposed assessment roll, and the agenda for the hearings and meeting may be obtained at the offices of the District Manager, located at 2300 Glades Road, Suite 410W, Boca Raton, Florida 33431, Ph: (561) 571-0010 ("District Manager's Office"), during normal business hours or on the District's website at http://sunshinewcd.net/. The public hearings and meeting may be continued to a date, time, and place to be specified on the record at the hearings or meeting. There may be occasions when staff or board members may participate by speaker telephone.

Any person requiring special accommodations at this meeting because of a disability or physical impairment should contact the District Manager's Office at least forty-eight (48) hours prior to the meeting. If you are hearing or speech impaired, please contact the Florida Relay Service by dialing 7-1-1, or 1-800-955-8771 (TTY) / 1-800-955-8770 (Voice), for aid in contacting the District Manager's Office.

Please note that all affected property owners have the right to appear at the public hearings and meeting, and may also file written objections with the District Manager's Office within twenty days of publication of this notice. Each person who decides to appeal any decision made by the Board with respect to any matter considered at the public hearings or meeting is advised that person will need a record of proceedings and that accordingly, the person may need to ensure that a verbatim record of the proceedings is made, including the testimony and evidence upon which such appeal is to be based.

RESOLUTION 2024-10

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE WATER SUNSHINE CONTROL DISTRICT **MAKING** DETERMINATION OF BENEFIT AND IMPOSING SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2024/2025; PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION AND ENFORCEMENT OF SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS; CERTIFYING AN ASSESSMENT ROLL; PROVIDING AMENDMENTS TO THE ASSESSMENT ROLL; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE

WHEREAS, the Sunshine Water Control District ("**District**") is a local unit of special-purpose government established pursuant to Chapter 298, *Florida Statutes* for the purpose of providing, operating and maintaining water control improvements, facilities and services to the lands within the District; and

WHEREAS, the District is located in Broward County, Florida ("County"); and

WHEREAS, the District has constructed or acquired various water control improvements and provides certain services in accordance with the District's adopted water control plan and Chapter 298, *Florida Statutes*; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors ("Board") of the District hereby determines to undertake various operations and maintenance and other activities described in the District's budget ("Adopted Budget") for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2024 and ending September 30, 2025 ("Fiscal Year 2024/2025"), attached hereto as Exhibit A; and

WHEREAS, the District must obtain sufficient funds to provide for the operation and maintenance of the services and facilities provided by the District as described in the Adopted Budget; and

WHEREAS, the provision of such services, facilities, and operations is a benefit to lands within the District; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 298, *Florida Statutes*, provides that the District may impose special assessments on benefitted lands within the District; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interests of the District to proceed with the imposition of the special assessments for operations and maintenance in the amount set forth in the Adopted Budget; and

WHEREAS, the District has previously levied an assessment for debt service, which the District desires to collect for Fiscal Year 2024/2025; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 197, Florida Statutes, provides a mechanism pursuant to which such special assessments may be placed on the tax roll and collected by the local tax collector

("Uniform Method"), and the District has previously authorized the use of the Uniform Method by, among other things, entering into agreements with the Property Appraiser and Tax Collector of the County for that purpose; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interests of the District to adopt the assessment roll ("Assessment Roll") attached to this Resolution as Exhibit B, and to certify the Assessment Roll to the County Tax Collector pursuant to the Uniform Method; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interests of the District to permit the District Manager to amend the Assessment Roll, certified to the County Tax Collector by this Resolution, as the Property Appraiser updates the property roll for the County, for such time as authorized by Florida law.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE SUNSHINE WATER CONTROL DISTRICT:

SECTION 1. BENEFIT & ALLOCATION FINDINGS. The provision of the services, facilities, and operations as described in **Exhibit A** confers a special and peculiar benefit to the lands within the District, which benefits exceeds or equals the cost of the assessments. The allocation of the assessments to the specially benefitted lands is shown in **Exhibits A and B,** and is hereby found to be fair and reasonable.

SECTION 2. ASSESSMENT IMPOSITION. Pursuant to Chapters 170, 197 and 298, *Florida Statutes*, and using the procedures authorized by Florida law for the levy and collection of special assessments, a special assessment for operation and maintenance is hereby imposed and levied on benefitted lands within the District, and in accordance with **Exhibits A and B.** The lien of the special assessments for operations and maintenance imposed and levied by this Resolution shall be effective upon passage of this Resolution.

SECTION 3. Collection and Enforcement; Penalties; Interest.

- A. Tax Roll Assessments. The operation and maintenance special assessments and previously levied debt service special assessments shall be collected at the same time and in the same manner as County taxes in accordance with the Uniform Method, as set forth in Exhibits A and B.
- **B.** Future Collection Methods. The decision to collect special assessments by any particular method e.g., on the tax roll or by direct bill does not mean that such method will be used to collect special assessments in future years, and the District reserves the right in its sole discretion to select collection methods in any given year, regardless of past practices.

SECTION 4. ASSESSMENT ROLL. The District's Assessment Roll, attached to this Resolution as **Exhibit B**, is hereby certified to the County Tax Collector and shall be collected by the County

Tax Collector in the same manner and time as County taxes. The proceeds therefrom shall be paid to the Sunshine Water Control District.

SECTION 5. ASSESSMENT ROLL AMENDMENT. The District Manager shall keep apprised of all updates made to the County property roll by the Property Appraiser after the date of this Resolution, and shall amend the District's Assessment Roll in accordance with any such updates, for such time as authorized by Florida law, to the County property roll. After any amendment of the Assessment Roll, the District Manager shall file the updates in the District records.

SECTION 6. SEVERABILITY. The invalidity or unenforceability of any one or more provisions of this Resolution shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remaining portions of this Resolution, or any part thereof.

SECTION 7. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Resolution shall take effect upon the passage and adoption of this Resolution by the Board of Supervisors of the Sunshine Water Control District.

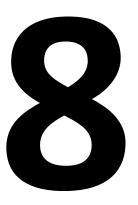

Pump Station 3 Replacement

An environmental resource permit application (ERP) submittal to the South Florida Water Management District was made on July 9, 2024 and comments have been received and a response to the review is forthcoming. CAS will be seeking price proposals from CAS recommended contractors for the proposed work in the interim.

WOFC Phase 3

A permit application submittal to the South Florida Water Management District was made on July 24, 2024 for construction dewatering and an application to the Broward County Biological Resources Division was made for the proposed canal improvements. Review comments have been received and responses are forthcoming. The CAS subconsultant arborist is coordinating with City on the tree mitigation fee and application pocess. Contract documents with project bid schedule are being prepared.

Right-of-way Permitting

Recommended is the approval of Comcast's ROW permit application for the installation 6 - 70 LF of 1 - 2" HDPE conduits (420 LF total) at several SWCD Canal locations per the attached plans.

We have reviewed a ROW permit application submitted by Comcast for the installation of 70 LF of 1-2" HDPE conduits 10 feet below existing storm pipe inverts at 6 SWCD Canal locations within the Westchester neighborhood. The applicant has met SWCD applicable subaqueous criteria and we recommend that the SWCD Board of Supervisors issue a Right-of-Way Permit to the applicant, subject to the following Special Conditions to be made part of the Permit:

- 1. All work must be in compliance with the latest SWCD Permit Criteria Manual.
- 2. Permittee will ensure that all necessary Sediment & Erosion Control devices will be utilized at the SWCD right-ofway during construction.

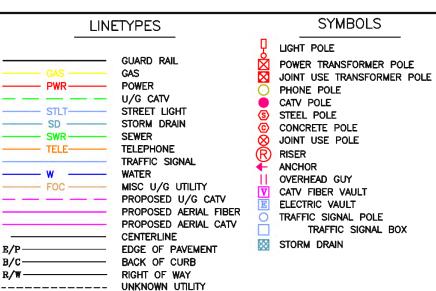






LOCATION MAP N.T.S.

OBSTRUCTIONS REMOVAL AGREEMENT - OPTION 2

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into this ____ day of August 2024, by and between <u>Alexandra Adesso and Michael Lester- Adesso</u> (hereinafter referred to as "Owner") whose address is <u>12188 NW 32 CT. Coral Springs</u>, <u>FL 33065</u> and the SUNSHINE WATER CONTROL DISTRICT (hereinafter referred to as "District") whose address is 2300 GLADES ROAD, SUITE 410W, BOCA RATON FL 33431

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, Owner holds title to a certain parcel of real estate more particularly described as:

WESTCHESTER 72-43 B LOT 14 BLK A

(hereinafter referred to as the "Property"), and

WHEREAS, the Property is encumbered by a certain right-of-way/easement (hereinafter referred to as the "ROW/Easement"), such Easement being for the benefit of the District and its drainage system, and

WHEREAS, the ROW/Easement has been obstructed by the unauthorized growth of vegetation and/or construction of structures within said ROW/Easement; and

WHEREAS, Owner, pursuant to Option 2 of the District's Right-of-Way/Easement Clearing Policy, elects to have the District remove said obstructions at the District's expense,

NOW THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the covenants set forth herein, Owner hereby agrees as follows:

- 1. The foregoing recitals are true and correct and are incorporated herein by reference.
- 2. The District will remove all obstructions located in the ROW/Easement at the District's expense subject to the terms herein. For purposes of this Agreement, "obstructions" shall be defined as all vegetation and all structures located on District property that prevent required maintenance and present a threat to human life, property, public health and safety, as depicted on Attachment A hereto. The District shall have sole discretion to determine what constitutes an obstruction pursuant to this Agreement.

- 3. The District's obligations pursuant to this Agreement are limited to a single, one-time-only removal of obstructions existing within the ROW/Easement at the time of this Agreement. The District shall not be obligated to remove, at its expense, obstructions placed within the ROW/Easement by Owner subsequent to the execution of this Agreement.
- 4. Subsequent to District's removal of existing obstructions from the ROW/Easement, Owner shall be required to maintain and mow the grassy areas within the ROW/Easement that remain adjacent to his/her property and keep the same free from all structures and growth of vegetation which may become obstructions of the ROW/Easement. Failure of Owner to comply with this requirement shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement and Owner shall be liable to the District for all costs associated with District's having to remove any subsequent obstructions or perform required maintenance.
- 5. If the District notifies Owner that he/she is in material breach of this Agreement and Owner fails to remedy the identified breach by removing the obstruction or performing the required maintenance within 30 days of receipt of notice, the District shall take all necessary steps to resolve the obstruction and Owner shall be invoiced and/or assessed on the Broward County tax roll the cost for the removal of all obstructions and/or performance of required maintenance, as well as any related administrative or legal fees that may be incurred by the District.
- 6. This Agreement shall be binding upon the Owner, its heirs, successors, legal representatives and assigns. This Agreement shall run with the title to the Property and shall forever benefit the District and bind the Owner and all future owners of the Property, including without limitation, their heirs, successors, legal representatives and assigns. This Agreement shall be recorded in the property records of Broward County, Florida and will become a legal obligation of the Property in perpetuity.
- 7. Owner for itself and on behalf of all future owners of the Property, hereby agrees to indemnify and hold the District harmless from and against any and all liabilities, damages, claims, costs and expenses, including attorney's fees, which may be imposed upon or asserted against the District arising from or in any way connected with the District's removal of obstructions within the ROW/Easement and/or related to Owner's subsequent maintenance of the ROW/Easement.
- 8. To the extent the terms of this Agreement vary from the District's Right-of-Way/Easement Policy, the terms of this Agreement shall prevail.
- 9. This Agreement may only be amended by written mutual consent of the District and Owner.
- 10. This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Florida. Venue for enforcement of this Agreement shall be in Broward County, Florida.
